Proposed FY 2019-20 State Budget



Education Remains #1 Priority

- \$200M increase for Basic Education (we'll break it down)
- \$50M increase for Special Education
- \$10M increase for Career and Technical Education (CTE)



Let's break it down...



Basic Ed Funding

• FY 18-19 Allocation – Just over \$6B

 Gov. Wolf proposes to combine or "roll in" the Ready to Lean Block Grant into school districts' base allocation.

Ready to Learn Block Grant - \$240M



Basic Ed Funding

- The \$200M Increase
 - \$20M in targeted supplements from FY 18-19 now in districts' BASE allocations.
 - Scranton \$6M
 - East Allegheny \$2M
 - Wilkes Barre \$1M
 - Allentown \$10M
 - Pottsville \$1M
 - Minimum salary boost \$14M
 - Formula Increase \$166M




BEF Breakdown

How much will be going through the BEF Formula this year?



How Money Gets in the Base




Special Ed Funding

- \$50M increase for special education
- Distributed through the special education fair funding formula
- Comparatively from 2008 to 2016, state funding for special education increased by only \$72M




Proposal would add \$50 million for special education

State Special Education Funding

^{**} Special education expenses do not include gifted support, early intervention, and other services that students may require.



Career and Tech Funding

- Subsidy Level Funded
- \$10M increase goes to the Pasmart grant program.
- The PAsmart pilot program provided investments of \$20 million dollars for STEM and computer science programs and \$10 million for job training for industry partnership and apprenticeship programs.
