

The 2025-2026 Education Funding Proposal Benefits **Yough SD**

The Pennsylvania courts found that the way the state has been funding public schools is unconstitutional, because the quality of students' education is determined by their zip code. Harrisburg lawmakers measured a \$4.5 billion gap in state funding that impacts 348 school districts. State lawmakers have taken a step towards an ambitious plan to sustainably fund public schools and decrease the pressure on property taxes. This year they must make the next installment as the second step toward delivering on their promise. This funding proposal also includes other funding increases and savings for all 500 school districts.

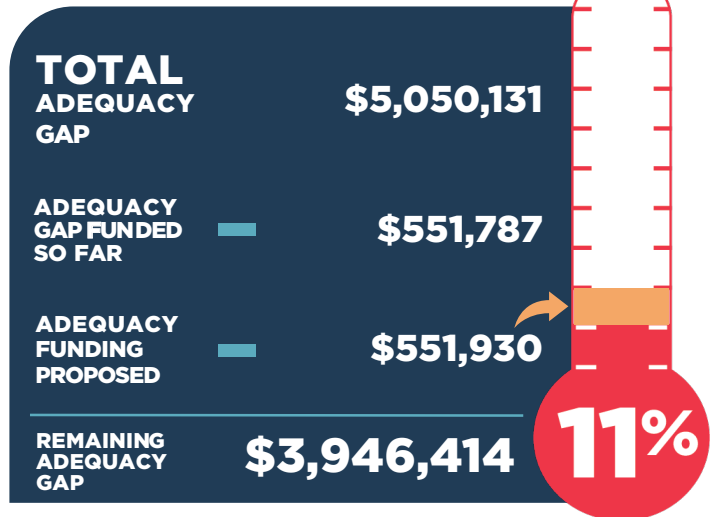
New Funds Would Be Allocated to Every School District, Including Yours

Included in New Funds for **Yough SD**:

- Substantial investments to address chronic and unconstitutional state underfunding via an Adequacy Supplement, which is intended to be the second installment in the plan to fully close the funding gap
- Funds to help balance the district budget by cutting exorbitant cyber charter costs
- Funds to continue to offer a quality education through increases to Basic Education Funding and Special Education Funding

PROPOSAL WOULD DELIVER \$985,594 TO YOUR DISTRICT

*The net savings assumes that the General Assembly will enact a flat \$8,000 per student rate for regular education cyber charter tuition. It also assumes the discontinuation of the \$100 million cyber transition line item that provided \$98,611 in funding to this district in 2024-2025.

Harrisburg lawmakers on both sides of the aisle agreed that Pennsylvania's schools have a remaining \$4 billion adequacy shortfall. By adopting this proposal, Pennsylvania will be one step closer to fixing the unconstitutional public school funding system that has failed students for too long.

Pennsylvania lawmakers have a constitutional obligation to adequately fund our public schools.
