



## READ THE ROOM: FUND PUBLIC SCHOOLS (NOT PRIVATE)

As reported by Spotlight PA, "A coalition with wealthy backers is pushing Pennsylvania lawmakers to use public dollars to create tuition vouchers so K-12 students can attend private schools." And, state Senate President Pro Tempore Kim Ward "is ready to make Lifeline Scholarships – and increasing current tax credit programs – her top priority."

This political payback has overtaken the Pennsylvania budget negotiations, while the Commonwealth Court decision in the school funding lawsuit, a clear mandate that lawmakers must fund a "thorough and efficient system of *public education* for all PA students," has been practically ignored.

### LET'S BE CLEAR: THERE IS NO WAY TO CREATE A *PRIVATE* SCHOOL VOUCHER SYSTEM THAT DOES NOT TAKE AWAY MONEY FROM *PUBLIC* EDUCATION.

# TAXPAYER DOLLARS TO PRIVATE AND RELIGIOUS SCHOOL VOUCHER PROGRAMS LIKE THE "LIFELINE" SCHOLARSHIPS MEANS:

- Less money for public schools with finite resources available;
- Higher property taxes when districts receive less from the state; and
- Money to wealthy families to send kids to private and religious schools because the programs are not based on need.

#### TAXPAYER DOLLARS TO VOUCHER PROGRAMS WILL NOT:

- Close the school funding gap because dollars to private and religious schools divert money from and harm public schools;
- Remedy PA's broken and unconstitutional school funding system; or
- Improve student outcomes because there is no accountability for the private and religious schools that will receive these taxpayer dollars.

### THIS IRONY SHOULD NOT BE LOST ON ANYONE FOLLOWING PENNSYLVANIA POLITICS:

A plan to shift funding away from public schools and into private schools after a court ruling that the inequity of Pennsylvania's long-underfunded public education system violates our Constitution.

Pennsylvania already has a **\$340 million per year** EITC/OSTC private school voucher program. Note that state law explicitly prohibits the collection of information about who benefits from these programs, so there is no evidence that EITC/OSTC programs even work.

Private and religious schools that receive EITC/OSTC funding are allowed to discriminate against and refuse to enroll students for any reason, including disability, race, socio-economic status, and sexual orientation. The same would be true of a new "Lifeline" scholarship program.

We don't need a new school voucher program in Pennsylvania, we need the Legislature to fund our public schools.

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
